Amid rampant inflation, Shelby Energy Cooperative is a resource hub for members who need help. We follow the cooperative principle, "Concern for Community." Shelby Energy Cooperative partners with area Community Action agencies to help support families in need of financial assistance to keep their heat on through our WinterCare program. For each member who donates \$50 or more to WinterCare, Shelby Energy will match \$50. Employees volunteer at the Ronald McDonald House and the Special Olympics Kentucky Summer Games in addition to participating in local community events year-round. This year, Shelby Energy sponsored one student on the Kentucky Electric Cooperatives Washington Youth Tour and awarded scholarships to eight other students.

Shelby Energy Cooperative is committed to open, transparent and helpful communications. In *Kentucky Living*, on social media and on Shelby Energy Cooperative's website, we share updates, tips and important information about our communities. We combat scam attempts targeting our members, from phone scams to dishonest sales pitches.



How Americans Use Electricity


