Safety: One lucky man's story

"Nothing could go wrong"

It's a line often repeated just before an accident or injury occurs. Truth be told, far too many of us have heard it, or said it.

Brandon Schroeder understands because those words begin his story.

It was almost quitting time on an August afternoon in 2011 when Brandon was asked to perform a simple task at a construction site: disconnect a power cord, pull it through a doorway and hook it back up. The veteran electrician chose to ignore the safety procedures he knew he should follow.

Brandon should have called the local utility to disconnect the power because there was no main breaker available. He didn't wear proper protective gear. He thought he would be fine. After all, he had performed the task many times and seen others take the same shortcuts.

"I thought I knew what I was doing," he admits about the cavalier attitude that almost cost him his life.

As he attempted to disconnect the power, the wire contacted a conductor

and exploded, burning over 16 percent of his body. Brandon was lucky. Most don't survive this sort of accident.

He was hospitalized for six weeks and physically crippled for six months. The emotional scars are still healing.

"I always think about the pain this caused my family, and how much worse it could have been," he says. "That sticks with me."

At first, it was a gut-wrenching ordeal for Brandon to stand in front of others and talk about the consequences of his poor decision. But he soon realized his message is powerful.

"Men come up to me with tears in their eyes, saying 'Tomorrow, I'm going to be a new person. I'm going to follow the rules so I can go home to my family every night," he says.

Now, Brandon is a man on a mission. He's delivered his safety message to some 50,000 people and will speak to thousands more this year. In addition, his website, BelieveInSafety.com, is helping him reach a global audience.

Your Safety Matters

Check your pool lighting and stay safe

With pool season about to begin, it's important to have the wiring and lighting inspected to ensure safe operation before letting people swim.

One of the greatest potential hazards of electrical shock in a pool comes from underwater lighting.

Calder Sloan, a 7 year-old boy who loved to swim, was killed by electrocution from faulty electrical connections to a light. A ground wire in his family's pool wasn't attached properly, which sent 120 volts of electricity to the pool light instead of the expected 12 volts.

To help prevent tragedy, upgrade old pool lighting to modern safety standards. The older the lighting, the greater the chance of electric shock.

Look for corrosion or damage to pumps and electrical wires in the pool area, and hire a licensed electrician for inspection and repairs. That one step may save a life or prevent serious injury.

Have a plan. Decide what you will do if your pool does become electrified. Identify where the power to the pool is and know how to shut it off immediately. The switch you need to flip may be an amp sub-panel close to the pool pump and filter.

In a pool emergency involving electricity, swimmers should exit the water without touching any metal on rails or ladders, and bystanders should call 911. Never jump into the water to rescue someone who is being shocked.
